- Through public adoption, the General Plan reflects **community values** and **priorities**.
- Both **private development** and **public action** must conform to this vision.







COMMUNITY SAFETY ELEMENT (2012)

- Particularly strong in tackling **seismic hazards**
- Strong perspective on addressing **life safety**
- Increased focus on **recovery and reconstruction**

Why Now



SB379: Requires cities to update Safety Element with climate resilience



SB1000: Requires cities to update General Plan with Environmental Justice element or policies



Hazards and Climate Resilience Plan: Proposes over 90 strategies to mitigate risks and adapt to all hazards



Climate Action Plan: Roadmap becoming a net-zero city, per the Paris Climate Agreement



Increased focus on racial equity

- Creation of Office of Racial Equity
- Requirement for all Departments to create Racial Equity Plans
- Planning & Historic Preservation Commissions' resolutions to incorporate Racial & Social Equity into the General Plan





GOALS

- Use local data to show additional areas that are lower-income and face high pollution & other health challenges.
- Better align with maps by MTC, SFDPH, Rec & Park, and others.
- Designate areas where policies and resources could be directed to promote community health.
- Develop an analysis that could be easily replicated in the future.

NOTE:

This map was created to meet the requirements of CA Senate Bill 1000. The legislation requires that municipalities identify where "Disadvantaged Communities" are located, defined as areas facing an elevated pollution burden coupled with a high incidence of low-income residents. This map is based on OEHHA's CalEnviroScreen 3.0 Map, modified to incorporate additional local data on pollution burden and socioeconomic disadvantage.

Hazards and Climate Resilience Plan



- Mission District



Coastal Flooding Vulnerability

Areas that are particularly susceptible to increased risk of coastal flooding due to sea-level rise (with no action) include:

- Mission Bay
- Islais Creek
- Hunters Point
- Candlestick Point
- Financial District
- Marina District
- Treasure Island
- SFO Airport


Article 38 Air Pollutant Exposure Zone

The Air Pollutant Exposure Zone identifies exposure based on cancer risk, air particulates, and proximity to freeways and other high-density arterial roads.

Equitable Community Safety	Prioritizing Vulnerable Communities	Use safety and resilience as a way of remediating existing disparities and redressing past systems-levels harms
Multi-Benefit Climate Resilience	Multi-Hazard Resilience	Maximize investments that build resilience against the shared threats and vulnerabilities of multiple hazards
Governance and Collaboration	Partnerships with Non-Government Bodies	Work with community organizations, institutions, and development partners to reach all San Franciscans


Summary of Intended Amendments to Existing Goals 4-7

- Incorporate climate resilience, environmental justice, and racial and social equity throughout Goals 4-7
- Increased emphasis on Goal 4 (Mitigation), use as overarching policies that Goals 5-7 refer back to
- Expand scope of existing seismic policies to apply to multi-hazards
- Add new policies specific to other hazards, such as sea level rise, flooding, and pandemic
- Include reference to recent efforts: Hazards and Climate Resilience Plan, Climate Action Plan, Tall Buildings Study, Sea Level Rise Action Plan, etc.
