

Criteria for Landmark Designation


- Properties significant for their association with **historic events**, including the city's social and cultural history
- Properties significant for their association with a **person or group** important to the history of the city, state or country
- Properties significant for their **architecture or design**, or a notable work of a builder, designer or architect of merit
- Properties that are valued as **visual landmarks**, or that have special character or meaning to the city and its residents
- **Collections of properties** or features that are linked by history, plan, aesthetics or physical development

Criterion A) Events

These properties are all significant for their associations with early San Francisco settlement.

Criterion B) People

James C. Hormel Mansion is significant as long-term home of LGBTQ philanthropist, activist and diplomat.

These properties are significant as the work of Architect of Merit Bernard Maybeck.



Landmark Designation Process



Character-Defining Features

- Express the cultural, historical and/or architectural significance
- Help tell the story of associated past eras
- Describe those features that should be retained and preserved
- Identified by stakeholders during designation process

Historic Preservation Entitlements

- **Certificates of Appropriateness**
Scopes of work involving demolition, new construction, or major alterations/ additions; approved by the Historic Preservation Commission
- **Administrative Certificate of Appropriateness**
Minor alterations such as cladding and window replacement; as delegated by the Historic Preservation Commission; approved by Planning staff
- **No Certificates of Appropriateness**
Ordinary maintenance and repair; approved “over-the-counter” by Planning staff

Benefits


- **Preservation:** provides clear and predictable review process for alterations while protecting character-defining features and can provide additional protection against demolition.
- **Mills Act:** provides qualifying participants with reduction in property taxes in exchange for the rehabilitation, preservation, and long-term maintenance of historic properties.
- **California Historical Building Code:** provides an alternative building code for the preservation or rehabilitation of historic properties.
- **Flexible Use Planning Code Incentives:** allows applicants to institute a wider array of land uses in certain historic buildings than what would otherwise be permitted in that building's Zoning District.

FAMILY ZONING PLAN LANDMARK CRITERIA



- **Historic Resource Status Code (CEQA) :** A
except existing A10-11 properties and listed or formally determined eligible NRHP or CRHR
- **Zoning :** All Districts, except RH and P
- **Dwelling Units # :** 0-1

Because each of San Francisco's cultural groups are distinct in their histories, practices, and cultural resources, cultural contexts do not require grouping into any sub-contexts. Because each cultural context document will explore a broad range of topics, cultural contexts also do not require division into separate theme documents. Cultural contexts will inevitably support the citywide context statement as a whole and find relevance in many of the other thematic and architectural contexts.
