Basic Two Requirements for Eligible Projects and Programs

• Within Tenderloin boundary.

Project or program occurs within the Tenderloin official boundary.

• Community-driven and designed.

Proposal comes from the Tenderloin community - *residents or community organizations serving the Tenderloin residents or businesses*.

- 60 currently on the list
- Proposed projects came from various residents and community organizations
- Proposed project includes:
 - $\circ~$ Arts and cultural activities
 - Community-building events
 - Streetscape improvements and maintenance
 - Safety and cleanliness
 - Open space and parks
 - Workforce development

What happens when/if a project doesn't move forward?

 Projects will have an opportunity to be considered as part of the Tenderloin Community Action Plan

Six Proposed Criteria (1-3)

Addresses needs

• Ability to problem solve and cater to one or more on-going issue(s) in the neighborhood.

Equitable Investments

• Equity populations is targeted as primary beneficiary of the project.

Feasible

• *Ready to be implemented as soon as funding becomes available.*

Six Proposed Criteria (4-6)

Builds capacity

• Invests in existing local resources and grow capacity in the neighborhood.

Innovative

• Goes beyond traditional practices and brings an innovative approach to a problem.

Celebrates the TL

• Highlights the existing positive aspects of the Tenderloin.

Projects and programs that are

- 1. Within the Tenderloin boundary
- 2. Community-driven and designed will be evaluated
